The Klingons want to make peace with the Federation, but, somehow, Kirk (Shattner) and McCoy (Kelley) don't believe them, and are imprisoned for attacking the Klingon's chancellor. On their grim cold planet, Kirk and McCoy plan an escape. Spock (Nimoy) is sure to help. There are no surprises in this film except for a Klingon chancellor wanting peace and the casting of "Sex and the City's" Kim Cattrall as a Vulcan. This episode is reminiscent of an old TV script blown up for the big screen. The voyage of the Starship Enterprise is almost over with the old crew still around in new ships.
