
Short Review: "Dark Star" (1974) by Dr. John L. Flynn

The crew of the spaceship <u>Dark Star</u>, whose commander (Saunders) is dead but kept alive and animated in a cryogenic freezer, have grown complacent over the last few months in deep space, and that boredom has begun to affect every aspect of their mission to destroy unstable stars; in fact, the crew is slowing going insane. When the pet alien (which is nothing more than a beachball with claws) gets loose, the crew's mad chase through the ship inadvertently triggers a series of events that lead to the destruction of the Dark Star by one of its talking bombs. Made with the ridiculously low budget of \$60,000 over a three-year period by Carpenter and O'Bannon, while film students at the University of Southern California, the cult classic satirizes key themes from Kubrick's "2001: A Space Odyssey," including paranoia, the breakdown of technology and the metaphysical boredom of astronauts on a deep-space voyage. The film is also very funny, particularly when Narelle attempts to surf down to a nearby planet on wreckage from the spaceship. Not to be missed.

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
